For our service mission work we helped with an organization called Martha's Table. While volunteering here we helped in their food pantry, and also in their clothing store. People would come in and we would fill their grocery bag full of fresh foods along with some canned goods. The "store" allowed folks to pick up fresh foods on a weekly basis. The day we volunteered at the clothing store we were in the back sorting through all of the clothing donations. Some students made sure only good donations would be put out on the racks while other students were out on the floor helping customers find clothing for themselves

and their family. What I found interesting about this organization was that they were willing to help those in need and help people get back on their feet. Martha's Table is structure in a way to not provide "toxic charity," or to enable people; rather, they are structured to empower people.

During our time at the Wesley Theological Seminary we were able to learn more about what seminary was as a whole and what makes the Wesley Theological unique from other seminaries. We were able to participate in a sample class and able to take part in a vibrant worship service one day. We were also able to take a tour of the campus which was nice as it allowed us to see more of the campus than just the living area we were staying in.

When we weren't volunteering with Martha's Table or spending time at the seminary, we were out doing fun things in the city of DC. We saw most of the monuments (Lincoln, Washington, MLK Jr., Vietnam, Korea, FDR, WW2), explored the National Museum of African American History and Culture, visited the White House, toured the Capitol, and saw a Wizards game. We also went and ate at a number of memorable restaurants, but one that will forever stand out in my mind was eating at Pete's Diner. We ate breakfast here one morning before going to the United Methodist building on Capitol Hill. We look forward to the many worship opportunities that will arise this upcoming spring semester.








